CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE Al Doyle

As you recall from our last newsletter, I questioned who our new president would betray first in his quest to impoverish the American people. The votes are now in and, instead of singling out one particular group, Bill decided it was more democratic to stab everyone in the back. Everyone, that is, except his mentors.

One of Bill's mentors is one Mr. Rubin, Assistant Secretary of the Treasury and formerly the Chairman of Goldman Sachs. Now we all know that government service is a selfless calling. No right thinking servant would ever misuse the levers of power to help a former employer. It is curious however, that prior to the president's call for national sacrifice, Goldman Sachs issued an urgent recommendation to its big shooter client base to quickly ease out of stocks and into long term government bonds. Remarkably, that foresightful call by Goldman was followed within a week by Secretary of the Treasury Bentsen's revelation that the Department of Treasurey would cease issuance of long term bonds in its ongoing efforts to float the national debt. The stagnant long bond market took off like a shot, while the stock market fell like a stone halting only for a dead cat bounce. Unlike the Bill of Rights, the law of supply and demand hasn't been repealed yet.

We have four years of Clinton ahead of us. By the end of his term a comparison will have shown Bush, Reagan and Carter as pikers compared to what Bill is going to borrow. We, on the other hand, have not been consulted about what the new regime's

plans for our future are going to cost us. One thing is clear, whatever liberties we now claim will be diminished by the geometrically increasing demands for federal and state revenues to pay the interest expense on those borrowings. month I wrote that "We will all be rooting for [Clinton] to get on with recruiting new Libertarians for us." Unfortunately, that growth is going to cause discomfort to genetic Libertarians. Newcomers are going to be angry at the power structure. Some will be unbalanced. surface, what other reasons would cause voters to align with an unknown party in the first place? We will have to be courteous and patient with new members. They may not have read Andrew Jackson's farewell address or Herb Spencer's essays, but they know they are getting screwed. The known order of Libertarian philosophy will be challenged and possibly softened by new members. We have to anticipate this pressure for change now. Less is seat of the pants management and it doesn't work.

This will be an important meeting this month. Our party, Libertarian Party of Oakland County, will begin defining its goals. I don't pretend that we aspire to win a national office at the County level. But, we need Libertarians at the local level to stop the pork barrel tax increases. We need Libertarians to get rid of local police seizure laws Not after we gain national office. Now! We can win at this level. need to win at this level. But, we must pick our targets first, then go after them. Identifying objectives allows us to see where we have succeeded or missed the mark. How we are going to do that is the job of the party's bylaws. They have to be discussed and agreed to before we can be a real organization. If, as

Libertarians, we can't agree on bylaws to pursue common goals, then we can't even win a free Amway demonstration. One of the easiest things to do during a growth period is to stray from the mission and goals. To start, we need a bylaw committee to draft and address problems we want to avoid in our bylaws. Today the County has 5 Congressional districts. The WCRC ends out newletters to many that are ot members. One major goal of a poltical party is to let people know hat you are alive. The WCRC has 3 evels of membership: \$300.00, 100.00, and \$20.00.

The WCRC targets races in Wayne County. People that are not targeted feel neglected. Ed feels the the party must focus in one area to win. It is important to have a candidate in all the races. People do not like to see a viable political Party without a candidate. A party has to have a name on the ballot even if its only on paper.

There is public perception that Democrats are a warm people party and Republicans are cold. A party needs a candidate that understands people and is gregarious. Bush's messages did not come across in this last presidential race, though his answers were good. People have to understand your message. Most people do not understand what the Libertarian Party stands for. A party must sell its principles. Using Land uage that people understand is important. #### "THE ONLY INDUSTRIALIZED NATION"

We have been told by Robert Reich and other political leaders that we lag behind other industrialized nations in almost all social areas. "We are the only industrialized nation in the world", Reich laments, "that has a two-tiered system of social mobility. Those that have a college education tend to move upward and those that do not have a college education tend to move downward. We must stop this inequity."

President Clinton recently reproved drug companies for charging "unconscionable" drug prices. "Our nation is the only industrialized nation in the whole world that does not guarantee childhood vaccinations for all children." Sounding more like a commercial for cotton then a pitch for his social programs, he went on to say, "It ought to be like clean water and clean air. It ought to be a fabric of our life."

As if to reinforce the "America lags" concept, our decison-makers are looking toward Europe to provide the answer. Our leaders have concluded that it is alright to raise taxes on gasoline. After all, our gasoline tax is lower than any other industrialized nation.

To illustrate further, recently our healthcare taskforce invited Prime Minister Brundtland of Norway to advise them on socialized medicine. The panel concluded that the American citizen is allowed too much choice in their health care, which makes the system costly. It is unfortunate that choice of doctors, hospitals, and procedures tends to do that.

The Norwegians are a poor example to look to for freedom of choice in all areas. A recent example will serve; Norwegians are unable to choose their own surname, or spelling of such, without State approval. Names ending in "son" must be spelled "sen" to differentiate them from Swedish names. This is hardly a model of elevated social consciousness. The popular consensus must be that comparisons of America to other industrialized nations are ridiculous.
