1992 LP Candidate Election Return Highlights

LP Presidential candidate Andre Marrou received about 284,000 votes nationwide, significantly less than the one million many LP analysts had hoped for. This result was attributed in large part to a loss of votes to Ross Perot, whom many voters chose over Marrou due to their concerns with "visibility" of their vote as a protest against Bush and Clinton.

In addition, there was an unusually large number (twenty-one) of alternative presidential candidates across the country. Marrou and Perot were the only alternative candidates on the ballot in all 50 states and the District of Columbia. Not counting votes for Perot (who spent more money on his campaign than all of the other presidential candidates combined), Andre Marrou received about 46% of the votes for alternative candidates (and the next alternative candidate received about 16% by this measure).

LP of Michigan Convention Coming Up April 30 - May 2

The LPM annual convention is being convened in Grand Rapids this year with the theme of "Religious Liberty." Details are still being worked out by the convention planning committee, but certain items can be mentioned now.

The convention will be held at the Days Inn in downtown Grand Rapids, and reservations for rooms must be made with the hotel by April 15 (ironic, isn't it?). Rooms are \$54 (single or double), plus \$6/person for additional people (more than two). Reservation cards will be mailed out in a couple of months.

The convention will include speakers, seminars, LPM elections, bylaws discussion, and all-around friendly Libertarian "hob-nobbing." (More information in next issue.)

Newsletter Labels Now Give Status Information

In the upper right corner of your address label is a one- or two-letter code. The major codes are, or begin with, the letters "M," "S," or "I." Certain labels also contain a date after the letter code. Here are some words of explanation.

If the first (or only) letter is an "M," this declares your membership status. After this code will be a date that indicates when you will need to renew your membership.

If the first (or only) letter is an "S," this indicates your status as a newsletter subscriber. The date indicates when you will need to renew your subscription (or, of course, become an LPWM member).

If the first (or only) letter is an "I," this indicates that you are receiving a few free issues of the newlsetter as the result of making an inquiry about the Libertarian Party. If you see a date after this code, you will continue to receive the newsletter until this date. If you join the LPWM by this date (\$10 annual membership dues), or if you donate at least \$5 to the LPWM for a one-year subscription to the newsletter, then, of course, you will continue to receive the newsletter after this date. Maybe we'll even talk about it at work. Mostly though, we go on and think that the government or somebody else will take care of the problems.

In the movie an accusation is made against whites and Asians that they are responsible for putting a gun shop and/or a liquor store on every corner in the "Hood." For what purpose?' So blacks will kill each other or destroy themselves in the process.

Racism isn't the reason for those businesses thriving. Economics is the reason. There is obviously a demand for those kinds of goods. And anyone with any kind of business sense will tell you that any good shopkeeper will meet the demand of any product. One more thing - these shopkeepers

On the other hand, LP candidates for Congressional, state, and local positions received better overall support than ever before in the history of the LP (i.e., since the December, 1971 founding). For example, four Libertarians were elected to the New Hampshire state house. Although no Libertarians have been elected to the U.S. Senate (yet), the total number of votes cast for LP Senate candidates was over 900,000, more than for any alternative party since 1914.

If those problems were in Beverly Hills or closer to home, East Grand Rapids, what would our response be? There would be such an outcry that the police would sweep down and put a swift end to this "crisis."

You Just Don't Get It! (An Editorial)

I was libertarian long before I knew the word "libertarian" existed. Years before I found out that there was a political party called the Libertarian Party, I was telling people that no person and no group of people has the right to force their values on anyone else, not even if they are acting as a representative of some government agency.

But so often when I'm discussing the very idea of libertarianism (individual liberty) with people, they seem to get bogged down with whether the libertarian position on any particular issue is "conservative" or "liberal." exasperated when people try to approach libertarianism in this way, because they demonstrate that they have just missed the whole point of libertarianism!

I've heard libertarians described as everything from "ultraconservative,"
"fence-straddlers." to "on the liberal fringe," Such comments prove that the commentators really do not understand libertarianism, even though they supposedly know "the libertarian position" on a particular issue.

Libertarianism is not about being conservative or

It's not about your beliefs regarding any particular issue. It's not about the control of gun ownership or tax credits for education or airline deregulation. These are peripheral Sure, the libertarian

perspective has a significant bearing on these issues, but what any person believes should actually be done is secondary to the fundamental principle of libertarianism.

fundamental libertarian principle has been stated in so many ways: the "non-aggression" principle, libertarian neutrality, "no one has the right to force her values on anyone else," "I do not believe in nor do I advocate the initiation of force to achieve social or political goals," and so on. Yet, as many times and in as many ways as this primary idea is articulated, people just don't get it!

Are libertarians conservative? Are we liberal? Are authoritarian? Are we libertarian?

We are all of these. And more. Being libertarian is not relevant to what we believe about how people should live, work, or play. Being libertarian has nothing to do with who we think people should associate with or what we think people should spend their money on. It has nothing to do with what we think people should eat, drink, smoke, or otherwise This is why among libertarians you will find a variety of beliefs that runs the gamut: Christians, Buddhists, and atheists; those who use all manner of recreational drugs and those who think that drinking beer, wine, or even coffee is a sin; pacifists and those who are on the gun course every other weekend with their Berettas.

What is important is this: As libertarians, we have reached the understanding that whatever our beliefs are, we simply do not have the right to coerce other people into adhering to our point of view. This still leaves all kinds of room for influencing others toward acting in ways that we personally believe are best. But those who cross the lines of voluntary influence and start using threats of aggression (stealing, bodily harm, kidnapping) initiate the interactions of violence and thus can say nothing when force is in turn used in defense against them. This is true of all criminals, even those criminals who call themselves (please try not to gag) our "public servants."

For Your Information Libertarian Periodicals

Reason

Reason ranks among the best of the libertarian periodicals - it is filled with good quality writing, well-done research, and mature libertarian thinking, and it all comes in a "slick," handsome publication. Reason has been published since the early '70s and has its contents indexed in the standard library reference Readers Guide. Reason is to libertarians what the National Review is to "rightists" and The New Republic is to "leftists." Publisher: Reason Foundation, 3415 S. Sepulveda Blvd., Suite 400, Los Angleles, CA 90034. One-year (11 issues) subscription price: \$19.95.

The Freeman

The Freeman is something like the "Readers Digest" of libertarianism (without all the advertising). In fact, several Freeman pieces have been republished in Readers Digest. The Freeman is a small booklet that runs about 40 pages long with short libertarian-oriented essays and articles. It usually contains one or two feature articles that are more lengthy and in-depth, such as "National Health Insurance: A Medical Dis-

aster" by Jarret B. Wollstein in the 10/92 issue that runs about 7 pages. In addition, The Freeman has a generally Christian perspective which may appeal to many in the West Michigan area. This periodical has been published since the middle 1940s by The Foundation for Economic Education, Irvington-on-Hudson, NY 10533. Subscription: from the periodical - "The costs of Foundation projects and services are met through donations. Donations are invited in any amount. A trial subscription to The Freeman is available to any interested person in the United States for the asking." I will add that if you like what you see when you get this monthly publication, you should probably donate at least \$20 to FEE for it. It's a good publication.
