LPM IMPRESSIVE IN RECORD VOTE

The Libertarian Party of Michigan, with US Senate candidate Jon Coon setting the pace, achieved record vote totals in the November 8 General Election. Coon took 128,117 votes in the race for Don Riegle's seat, an increase of 100,000 over Dick Jacobs' total in the 1988 try for the same seat. Coon, like Jacobs a knowledgeable and attractive candidate, far outstripped previous LPM challengers in fundraising, time spent and organization. The effort, managed by Barbara Goushaw, attracted the largest group of volunteers yet, which bodes well for growth in membership.

Coon took 4.21% of the vote, four times the amount needed to retain ballot status and 84% of the number needed to attain major party status. Name recognition for the Party was also a beneficiary with a nearblizzard of blaze-orange signs and bumper stickers throughout the state and many media interviews.

The gain was not limited to the Senatorial contest. Votes for the eight statewide education offices also surged. Erwin Haas took 88,033 votes for the State Board of Education, second only to Mary Ruwart's vote two years ago, and David Raaflaub also did well. Emily Salvette's 104,065 and Gary Bradley's 86,235 were the best ever for U-M Regent. Mary Ruwart and Ben Bachrach broke the LPM MSU Trustees record with 97,033 and 82,902 respectively as did Tom Jones and Brian Wright for Wayne State Governor with 105,290 and 102,543. These were all around 3-4%.

The votes for other offices varied. The four candidates for US House finished in the 2% area while State Senate candidates

ranged from 1.53 to 4.98%, the latter for Leslie Balian. The State Rep. races attracted 0.94 to 3.91%, the latter by Bob Van Oast, all comparable to 1992.

In the Ann Arbor City Council races, Doug Friedman took 12.03% in a two-way contest while Richard DeVarti grabbed a very impressive 616% in a three-way race.

County commissioner elections produced some 4% results with Jeff Terhaar getting 15.1 and Jeff Grund 17.7%

All in all, the results were quite encouraging. Jon Coon proved that a principled libertarian with a well-organized, well-financed and innovative campaign can get both votes and media attention. He had TV debates on PBS and on Channel 7 in Detroit. His performance in radio interviews was impressive from the start and perfect in the latter stages. The "coattail" effect did not extend to the lower offices, but those who ran more active campaigns did better than the paper candidates.

Many were disappointed that we did not attain major party status, but we came close for the first time, retained ballot status by a large margin and we now have two years to train our local and county organizations to handle the legal complexities of major party status if we win it in 1996. Also, a growing membership will give us a lot of influence in selecting a Presidential candidate at the 1996 National Convention.

Finally a huge THANKS to all the Party regulars and Jon Coon "rookie" volunteers who worked like real veterans, especially Barb Goushaw, innovator, motivator and manager.

LP of Mid-Michigan (Lansing area) meets at Sneeker's Restaurant, 600 N. Homer, off US-127, Lansing second Thursday of month.


Oakland LP meets at Mr. B's Restaurant, 423 Main St., Rochester on the third Wednesday of the month.

District 4: Our choice is Jeff Grund

James Shotwell, Republican and chairman of the county board, is being challenged by Jeffrey Grund, a Libertarian.

Mr. Shotwell has provided energetic leadership in a period when many county reforms have been adopted. However, we have sharp differences with him over the role of chairman. During the past term those differences came into focus when Mr. Shotwell helped grease the skids for the appointment of Randy Treacher as director of the Jackson County Health Department. We were very uncomfortable when the board chairman embraced a candidate who recommended himself for the job while misrepresenting the recommendations of the committee that studied appointment options. We're also uncomfortable at how involved Mr. Shotwell has remained despite the hiring of a county manager.

Mr. Grund is as straight an arrow as one could find. He is scrupulously careful with facts, fair and evenhanded in his assessment of people and issues. He impressed us with his common sense and grasp of county issues ranging from the landfill to commissioners' compensation (he'd vote for no salary, just some expense money for mileage).

How does his Libertarianism come into play? On the issue of the Medical Care Facility, he questions whether government should be operating such a facility. But since taxpayers do support the facility, he reasoned, the administration ought not to complain when commissioners exercise oversight. That pragmatic approach is welcome to any government body.

For those reasons, we recommend that Jeffrey Grund be elected county commissioner in the 4th District.

FREEDOM FRONTLINE

We are receiving an increasing number of requests for speakers from high schools, colleges and other groups. Jon Coon, of course had many opportunities to speak during his Senate campaign as did other candidates. in addition, we get requests for a general presentation of the Libertarian philosophy.

Emily Salvette and Keith Edwards spoke to five sessions with four classes in each at Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton High Schools. The sessions were video-taped and well received. They indicated that they would have us back.

Keith has spoken recently at high schools in Southgate, Rochester-Avon, Sterling Heights and an Islamic school in Ann Arbor. He also spoke to three classes at Monroe County Community College, the fourth time he has been there. Only one of the teachers was already libertarian, but several others have expressed a growing respect for our position.

Investor's Business Daily continues to run libertarian-leaning articles on almost a daily basis. Recent articles include The Privatization Gap by Reason Magazine's Robert Poole; a blast at HUD suggesting abolishing the agency, another favorably reviewing the way immigrant groups are melding into the culture and a comparison of the means used in Hong Kong and Singapore to achieve their rapid growth rates, concluding "The lesson from Hong Kong and Singapore seems clear. The path to increased efficiency and greater wealth is through knowledge and market freedom - not government intervention."

Some of us have said for years that all we need to retain from the US Government are the Departments of Defense, State, Justice and Treasury. In a November 14 Wall Street Journal article, George Melloan "deinvents" government by slicing functions and Departments and ends up with - guess what? The Departments of Defense, State, Justice and Treasury. Are we getting the word out or what?

Then, to top it all, on November 17, in a TV interview, Charlie Rose asked the thoughtful but inconsistent conservative pundit George Will, who exhibited some changes of view if Will was "becoming more libertarian. Will quickly acknowledged that "Yes, I am becoming more libertarian."

Add to this the wipeout of the liberals on November 8, and the at least verbal moves by the Republicans toward our position and it is becoming clear that we have come a long way since the birth of the libertarian movement just a generation ago.

We can't quit now. We are on a roll.

From this aspect, therefore, the whole of economics can be reduced to a single lesson and that lesson can be reduced to a single sentence. The art of economics consists in looking not merely at the immediate but at the longer effects of any act or policy; it consists in tracing the consequences of that policy not merely for one group but for all groups.

POLICY ON MEETINGS

All meetings of the Executive Committee and the Libertarian Advisory Council will start at the scheduled time.

The Council is the legislative body of the LPM between annual conventions. Quorum is 30% of the membership including proxies. The By-laws specify that a member giving his proxy to another can do so only by giving that person his membership card for the duration of the time the proxy is in force. If there is no quorum at the scheduled meeting time, a meeting of the Executive Committee will begin instead. All LPM members may vote at Council meetings, but only members of the Committee may vote at Committee meetings.

At the Annual Convention, all members who register and attend may vote, but a first time member must have been a member for at least 30 days prior to the Convention to vote. There are no proxies at the Convention.
