"SECOND SEMIANNUAL" LPM NOMINATING CONVENTION

Nine new state house candidates were nominated along with the original nominees from the May convention at the special, Second Semiannual LPM Nominating Convention held at LPM Headquarters on Sunday, August 5. State house candidates were required to be "renominated" and recertified with duplicate duplicate paperwork as a result of the Michigan Supreme Court's June decision on redistricting.

Additional state house candidates include Gerald Skell--District 2, Steven Mackie--32nd, Harold Dunn--70th, Rudy Zornick--72nd, Ken Warren, Jr.--87th, Clifford Schwink--97th, Denise Kline 109th, Joseph Jindrich 110th.

The total number of LP state house candidates however is still contested. The unique situation caused confusion among county clerks, candidates, and others which resulted in errors regarding paperwork. The Elections Division expects to have a final list of candidates within two weeks. At least two candidates were disqualified on technicalities with respect to filings--one refused to refile paperwork and another declined the nomination to the "new" district.

GUEST COLUMN

In just a few months we will have the opportunity to participate in what is perhaps the most important of American traditions—the election of our President. This country's entire political system was founded on the principles of free elections and self-government. It is the responsibility of every citizen to see that these principles are upheld, for they have contributed much to the happiness and welfare of Americans.

But there is another principle that is equally important to the continued welfare of American citizens—the principle of individual freedom. According to this principle, it is the right and responsibility of each individual to pursue happiness in his or her own way, without help or hinderance from government. According to this principle, government is not the solution to our problems; rather, the power of government and the tendency of leaders to abuse this power is one of the problems we must contend with.

Unfortunately, our politicians seem to have forgotten that it was the effort and ingenuity of *individuals* that made this country great; *not* the government.

In the coming months, many politicians will be asking for your vote. Most will tell you that they have the solutions to the problems confronting America today, that if you simply give them the power to do so, they will make things right. Very few will tell you that the power of *government is the problem*. Republicans and democrats list the problems facing this country endlessly. If we listen to these politicians, the power of government is likely to be limitless as well.

But can government solve these problems? The Libertarian Party says NO! Government cannot solve this country's problems because government is the cause of them.

Inflation is probably the most serious problem facing the U.S. today. It decreases the buying power of every American. It is particularly hard on the poor and those on fixed incomes. One of the foremost causes of inflation is the Federal deficit. Deficit spending pumps massive quantities of new money

into the economy without creating new goods and services to be purchased with this money. The result is predictable; the value of our money is undermined.

If inflation is to be brought under control, the federal government must cease spending billions upon billions of dollars that it does not have.

Equally important, the host of economic regulations and controls that hamper productivity must be done away with. The productivity of American workers and firms has been stifled by regulations on prices, products, conditions of employment, and virtually every other aspect of business. These regulations divert hundreds of millions of dollars yearly into useless programs and paperwork. They prevent American businesses from using new technologies and offering new products that could satisfy consumer demands cheaply and efficiently. The result is less for everyone and that at a higher price.

The record of government in the area of foreign policy is not better. Since War World II, the U.S. has tried to play the role of provider and protector to virtually the entire world. We have invested hundreds of billions of dollars in foreign and military aid. And billions more have been spent on our military presence felt around the world.

The foreign aid has clearly not purchased affluence for most of the nations around the world. In fact, foreign aid has done substantial damage to the economies of many nations by making them dependent on the U.S. for basic goods and services, thereby hampering the growth of domestic suppliers. And our willingness to intervene in political and military conflicts around the world has given us the reputation, whether deserved or not, of being the world's most oppressive nation.

We could go on forever, but everyone knows the problems that face our country today and most people are aware of government's role in creating them. But, what can be done about them?

The answer is nothing, so long as we continue to believe politicians

who tell us that they will solve all our problems if we just give them enough power. Fact is that it is not in the interests of governmental leaders to solve these problems. These problems make it easier for them to convince us that we still need them to solve the problems. But the problems seem to get worse instead of better and the call for more government and less freedom continues.

The time has come to try a new approach. The time has come to remember our heritage, to put our faith in people rather than in government. The government has used its power to create problems rather than solve them. The time has come to take away that power.

President Reagan seems not to realize this. His administration continues to interfere in the economy, they continue to spend, they seem to revel in foreign policy deals, and they continue to raise taxes. And probably most important, Reagan failed to abolish draft registration as he promised during the last campaign.

Reagan's political ideology is philosophically bankrupt and it is wholly incompatible with the American tradition of individual self-determination. It is the ideology of a man who believes that people cannot conduct their own affairs peaceably and productively without the watchful eye of government.

The Libertarian principles which we espouse offer an alternative to this ideology. We believe people can conduct their own affairs and do a better job of it than the government. The cure for the country's ills is not to concentrate more and more power in the hands of increasingly unresponsive leaders. It is to give free reign to the spirit and determination of the American people.

The cure for our economic woes is not more government regulation. Instead, we must drastically reduce government spending in all areas and do away with the agencies and controls that hamper economic growth.

The cure for our foreign policy woes is not to bully foreign opponents into submission. Instead, we

Leef sets sights on congressional seat

Northwood Institute economics instructor George C. Leef of Midland has announced his intention to run for the 10th District congressional seat as the Libertarian Party candidate.

Mr. Leef, 33, opposes incumbent Rep. Donald Albosta, D-St. Charles, and challenger Bill Schuette, a Republican.

"The voters in this election need a real choice, rather than having to choose between two candidates who are generally supporters of the status quo," Mr. Leef said.

"If we are to regain personal freedom and restore our economy to a healthy condition, we must make some significant changes, and I believe that I will be the only candidate advocating such changes."

Mr. Leef, who said he will run his campaign "solely on the issues," said the Libertarians believe this country has gotten too far away from the proper role of government — limited to the protection of life, liberty and property.

"Both the Republicans and the Democrats have given us a steady diet of more taxes, more spending and more regulation. They have benefited well-organized interest groups at the expense of the average citizen, who doesn't usually even know what the government is doing.

"That's why we need a party of principle, with candidates who will discuss the need for change honestly with the people," Mr. Leef said.

He said he looks forward to the opportunity to debate the issues with his opponents.

"In my view, each candidate owes the voters that much," he said.

"Unfortunately, I won't have hundreds of thousands of dollars to spend to get my message across as my opponents will, but I think it is important to try, anyway."

HUDLER CAMPAIGN OFF WITH A BANG

In Ann Arbor just four hours after fairly official results were given out at 6:30 a.m. the day after the Primary, the Hudler for Congress Campaign took off with a bang by sending out a certified letter to the Democratic and Republican rivals in the Second District. The letters carried a challenge for a series of 3-way debates. At the same time, a news release mentioning the letter and quoting from it was sent out to all major media serving the District (NW Wayne, N & W Washtenaw, S Jackson, Hillsdale, N Lenawee and two townships in E Branch Counties). It was felt that with a certified letter followed by a news release, the Demagogue and Republicrat will be forced to take his candidacy seriously and not lock him out of any debates.

Some of the real work, however, did not wait for the Primary. The last month or two letters have been sent out to various peace groups pointing out the foreign policy issues and asking for speaking time. Plans have also been formulated for talks in government classes in the high schools, community colleges and universities. Professional-looking literature has been printed up and shortly buttons will also be ready. A series of "Main Street Walks" is also being planned. Hudler will walk down both sides of the major downtown thoroughfare and introduce himself to passers-by and give them some literature. Local media will also be contacted. Jeffrey Grund is Treasurer of the campaign and Jim Greenshields is its Chair.

LIBERTARIAN NAME RECOGNITION STRATEGY COMMENT

Dr. Mary Ruwart, a Kalamazoo libertarian, spoke to a university finance class about "wealth." She concluded her discussion with a brief description of the libertarian Party. Shortly thereafter, a student approached Dr. Ruwart and stated, "You guys need to do T.V. commercials." We, as a growing movement, have witnessed the visibility television provides us. However, our coffers aren't big enough to allow repeated expenditures of this type; but that does not mean that all forms of advertising are too expensive.

Let's face it: until people are cognizant of the word "libertarian" and use it, we will suffer slow growth. Putting "libertarian" into mainstream usage can be accomplished quickly, efficiently, and at a price affordable to all. Imagination and creativity is all it takes.

The word "quiz" did not exist until a gentleman in England, after accepting a bar bet, waged a graffiti war in pub bathrooms across the United Kingdom. By writing the letters q-u-i-z on bathroom walls, the word quiz was invented, popularized, accepted and used. This method isn't advocated as it is defacing private property, but it serves as an example of how easily and economically the "Libertarian Party" can be incorporated into the conversations and minds of Americans.

Most medium-sized retail stores sell personal computers and have a working display model available to customers. The monitors (T.V. screen) of these display computers can be turned into electronic billboards in less than one minute. By

typing the words "Libertarian Party" on the screen several times and including a brief definition, you'll have educated at least one person (the next one who plays with the computer). Time, and not much of it, is all this example requires. One tip, clear the screen of all printed debris by hitting the "return" key so there is no competition for the reader's attention.

Bumper stickers on cars is a common example of inexpensive advertising. If you don't like putting them on your car permanently, tape them in the rear or side windows so that they can be removed easily. Short sayings written on the back of envelopes will be read by a postal worker or two and the person to whom it is addressed. I have never had problems with delivery of personal letters with "Vote Libertarian" printed in large letters on the back. Handing out social insecurity cards (1¢ apiece) is another way to leave an impression on a person.

Simply using the words "libertarian" and "Libertarian Party" in daily conversations is another way of increasing the public's awareness of our existence. Think of how many people you talk to in any given day, month, or year. After hearing "libertarian" day-in and day-out, these people will begin to recite it themselves--if only to complain to others about the idiot who only acknowledges one political party!

The above examples will reach small numbers of people, which is much better than reaching none. An effective way, though, to educate a sizeable population about the Libertarian Party and its positions, is through call-in talk shows on the radio and television.

When applicable, a person should call in to the program, identify themselves as a libertarian and ask an intelligent question. After the radio personality or their guest has given their response, the caller should agree, providing a few additional facts, or disagree and state the reasons why. If one feels that saying they're a libertarian at the onset of their question will cause ears to turn deaf, they can wait until their rebuttal (or agreement) to say "I am a libertarian."

Once the identifying labels (libertarian or Libertarian Party) become commonplace, people will begin satisfying their curiosity by learning what libertarians have to offer them. Considering the dismal state of current politics, it shouldn't take much to get people interested in the only true alternative to more big brother government.

We are limited in the resources available to promote individual liberty. But through creativity and imagination, we can put those resources to their most effective use.

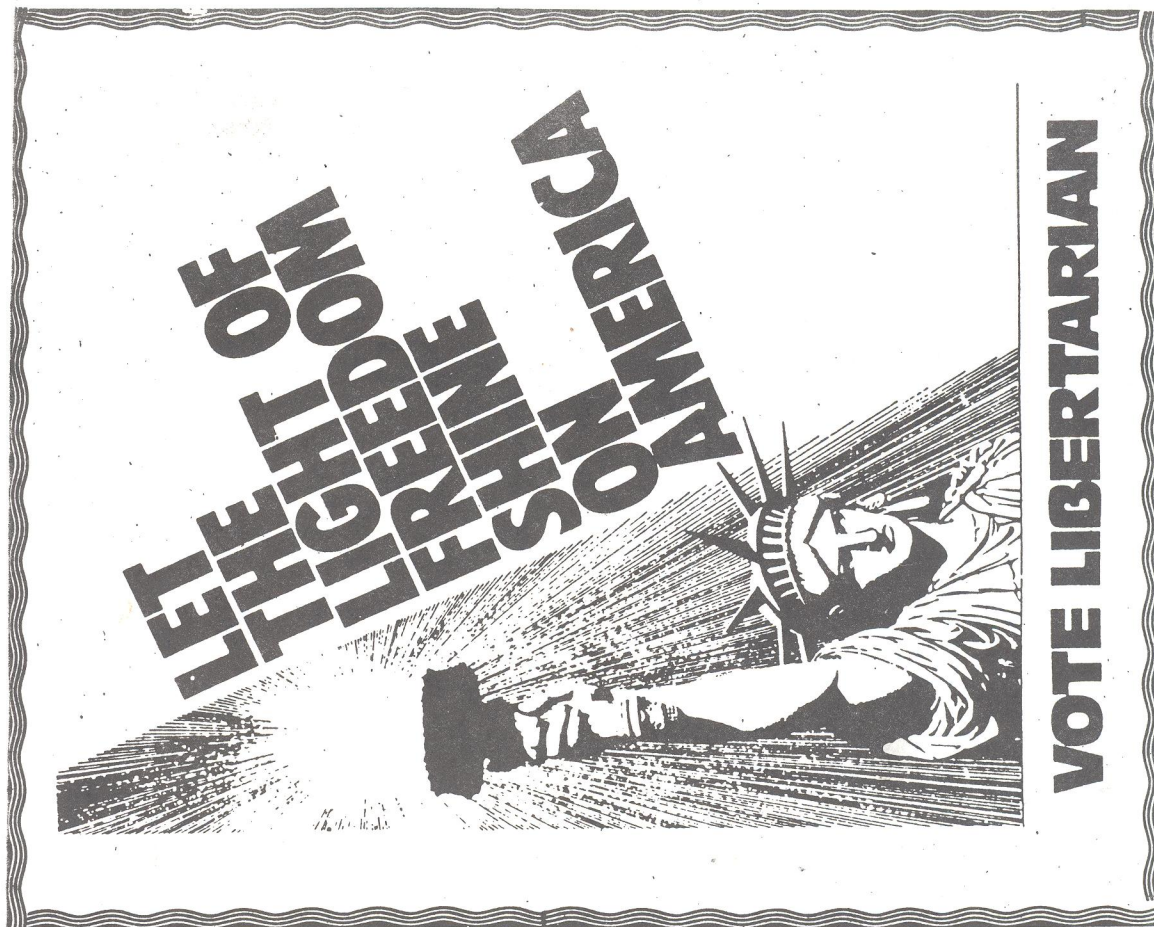
